### EDITORIAL

### AUGUST MATCH SUMMARY

Now that the first month of the season is over we find the WOLVES sadly near the bottom of the 1st Division.

The season kicked off at Newcastle where the Wolves came out losing 3:2 in a keenly contested game. Playing both their close season signings, Hegan and Gould, Wolves at one stage were 3:0 down but goals by Dougan and Curran gave a more respectable score-line.

The next game, at home to last season's surprise side Derby, turned out to be a goal feast. The game's 6 goals all came within 20 minutes of each other. Alas Derby decided that that was enough and played a cautious game in the second half to turn out 4:2 winners. Wolves goals were again scored by Dougan and Curran.

The following Saturday saw Wolves play Spurs at Molineux. Many of you will have seen the game on T.V. There is little to say about this game because Wolves display, to say the least, was bad. This is the sort of display that you see at the end of the season, not at the start.

So to Coventry, the next Tuesday, and what a change! Wolves gave, in my opinion, their best display for 2 years. The change from Saturday was unbelievable, every player was outstanding. The goal, after 68 minutes, was a brilliantly executed move involving Bailey, Wagstaffe, Gould and the scorer Curran. Possibly the two really outstanding players for Wolves were Holsgrove and Munro.

The final game of the month at Nottingham started hopefully when Curran scored after 4 minutes with a tremendous left foot shot from 18 yards. But alas it wasn't to last and Forest drew level after 9 minutes. Holsgrove's absence, he was injured in the first half, began to take its toll in the second half. Forest took control and scored 3 more goals to inflict on Wolves their heaviest defeat of the season, 4:1.

So a bad month for Wolves with only 2 points out of 5 games. I am sure that improvement is only just around the corner but it is going to take time and that is something you don't get in the 1st Division.

### CLOSE SEASON TRANSFERS

Last season was a disappointment to Wolves. The first half of the season showed great promise and until Christmas they were well up with the leaders. The start to 1970 heralded their slump and they finished in the lower half of the table.

Wolves only scored 55 goals in 42 League games. Twenty of these were scored by Hugh Curran, next came Jim McCalliog with eight goals in 42 appearances. The scoring power may be increased this season by Wolves two transfer surprises. Bill McGarry captured Albion's unsettled player, Danny Hegan, for £30,000 and Arsenal's striker, Bobby Gould.

Last season McGarry tried to sign Hegan from Ipswich and was prepared to pay £70,000 but Albion pipped him and bought Hegan in a £90,000 deal. Hegan never settled at the Hawthorns, he lost his first team place and was disciplined by the club for various misdemeanors. Irish international Hegan threatened to quit football but in May he had a change in heart when McGarry stepped in to buy him. Hegan made his debut for Ipswich in 1963-64 and for Albion last season. Although a Scotsman, he was born in Coatbridge, he has recently played for Northern Ireland, qualifying because one of his parents is Irish.

McGarry's second signing was at the beginning of June when he paid £50,000 for Arsenal's bustling striker Bobby Gould, in an effort to liven Wolves goal-scoring strength. Gould went to Arsenal from Coventry for £90,000 in February 1968 but lost his first team place last season and made only 12 appearances.
