- Sep 18 Paul Simpson joins Walsall on one month's loan.
- Sep 19 HUDDERSFIELD TOWN (Away) 1-2 (Keane). An injury time goal robs Wolves of a deserved point after Robbie Keane's late goal looks to have earned Wolves a point against the league leaders.
- Sep 22 BOURNEMOUTH (Home) Worthington Cup 2nd rd 2nd leg 1-2 (Keane). Aggregate 2-3. A magnificent display by keeper Mark Ovenden and poor marking by Wolves for both Bournemouth goals, ends Wolves' interest in the competition.
- Sep 24 Steve Froggatt set to join Coventry for £2 million after Wolves reluctantly accept that he will not sign a new deal. Middlesbrough are also interested but he is thought to prefer Coventry. The deal is expected to go through tomorrow.
- Sep 25 Although it is understood that he has agreed terms with Coventry, Steve Froggatt meets with Middlesbrough manager Bryan Robson about a possible move to Teesside. He is now expected to make a decision about his future, after the weekend.
- Sep 26 BURY (Home) 1-0 (Bull). A fine goal by Bully gives Wolves a hard-earned three points.
- Sep 29 Q.P.R. (Home) 1-2 (Foley). Another defensive nightmare for Wolves as Q.P.R. gain their first away win for a year. Steve Froggatt completes £1.9 million move to Coventry, despite late interest from Derby. Wolves' home match v Sheffield Utd on 10th October has been postponed due to international call-ups.

- Oct 2 Mark McGhee and John Richards in Germany watching players.
- Oct 3 CREWE ALEXANDRA (Away) 0-0. After a poor first half, Wolves dominate the second half but fail to turn a number of good chances into goals.
- Oct 6 Steve Bull is to undergo an operation on his knee and will be out of action for at least three weeks.

 John Richards reveals continental targets as Albanian international striker Igle Tare and German midfielder Robert Niestroj who play for Fortuna Dusseldorf. Glen Crowe has been recalled from his loan move to Exeter.
- Oct 7 Wolves' match v Sheffield Utd has been rearranged for Tuesday 10th November.
- Oct 10 Adrian Williams scores Wales' first goal in their 2-1 win v Denmark in Copenhagen.
- Oct 14 Robbie Keane scores twice for Republic of Ireland in their 5-0 win over Malta in Dublin. He becomes the youngest ever goalscorer for the Republic. John Richards elected to Football League Board of Directors as the Division One representative.
- Oct 15 Mark McGhee considering a £1 million bid for Igle

 Tare after watching him score for Albania in their 2
 2 draw with Norway in Oslo.
- Oct 16 Wolves are facing an injury crisis prior to Saturday's match at Portsmouth. Steve Bull, Simon Osborn, Dean Richards and Adrian Williams are all



out of the match, whilst Keith Curle and Robbie Keane are both doubtful. Kevin Muscat is also missing because of a one match ban.

- Oct 17 PORTSMOUTH (Away) 0-1. Two controversial refereing decisions decide the outcome of this match. Keith Curle is adjudged to have fouled Steve Claridge in the penalty area and is sent-off, but the referee ignores Wolves' appeals for a penalty, when a goal bound shot appears to be handled on the line by a Pompey defender.
- Oct 18 Robbie Keane will be out of action for at least one month as he needs surgery on a knee injury.
- Oct 20 CRYSTAL PALACE (Away) 2-3 (Sedgley 2). A fine second half fightback by Wolves almost snatches an unlikely point.
- Oct 22 The deal for Igle Tare is put on hold as also has a move for Icelandic midfielder Arnar Gretarsson.
- Oct 23 Keith Curle may need an operation on the knee which has troubled him all season.
- Oct 24 GRIMSBY TOWN (Home) 2-0 (Foley, Curle pen.). A determined performance and deserved win for Wolves in front of their lowest League crowd for five years.
- Oct 25 Robbie Keane has had his knee operation. A possible comeback date of December 12th has been mentioned.
- Oct 26 Mark McGhee Joins hunt to sign Everton midfielder
 Gareth Farrelly who will cost Wolves £800,000.

 Aberdeen's Craig Hignett also linked with a move
 to Molineux. Villa striker Darren Byfield is also
 mentioned as a possible target.
- Oct 27 Mark McGhee charged by F.A. on a misconduct

charge for comments made to the referee after the Portsmouth match. Dean Richards says he will leave Molineux next summer unless Wolves achieve Premiership football.

- Oct 28 Mark McGhee asks for a personal hearing to answer F.A. misconduct charges. Keith Curle indicates that he might also leave at the end of the season if Wolves fail to gain promotion.
- Oct 29 John Richards says that any player not committed to the club can leave. Simon Osborn expected to be fit for Saturday's match. Neil Emblen or Steve Sedgley will replace the suspended Keith Curle. Wolves will not be signing Igle Tare because of work permit problems and the size of the transfer fee.
- Oct 31 BARNSLEY (Home) 1-1 (Muscat pen). Another disappointing home result against 10-man Bamsley, after a bright first half performance.
- Nov 1 Everton's out of favour striker Mikhael Madar is the latest player linked with a move to Wolves. He is valued at £1 million and Wolves may opt to sign him initially on loan.
- Nov 2 Wolves sign Guy Whittingham from Sheffield Wednesday on one month's loan. He was previously on loan to Wolves in 1994.
- Nov 3 IPSWICH TOWN (Away) 0-2. Despite playing some neat football Wolves lack penetration against inform Ipswich, as the mounting pressure on Mark McGhee increases.
- Nov 4 Wolves set up deal to sign Celtic striker Darren

 Jackson on a three-month loan.
- Nov 5 Wolves announce that Mark McGhee has left the club by mutual consent. Colin Lee has been put in

temporary charge of the team. David Platt is the fan's favourite to take-over as manager. Other names being mentioned are Ron Atkinson and Port Vale manager John Rudge. John Richards says the club have no successor in mind and the club will invite applications for the post. Because of Mark McGhee's departure the Darren Jackson deal has been put on hold.

- Nov 6 More names are put forward by the press as possible contenders for Mark McGhee's job. In addition to Platt, Atkinson and Rudge, big names such as Kenny Dalglish and Graeme Souness are mentioned as well as Steve McMahon, Lou Macari, ex-Bristol City manager John Ward and Northampton manager lan Atkins.
- Nov 7 BRISTOL CITY (Away) 6-1 (Whittingham, Connolly 4, Robinson). A dream start for Colin Lee as City are destroyed by a superb Wolves performance. John Richards reveals that there have already been 20 applications for the manager's post although the job has not yet been formally advertised.
- Nov 8 Wolverhampton born Stuart Baxter, currently managing AIK Stockholm in Sweden, has emerged as a leading contender to be the new manager according to press reports. His team have just become league champions.
- Nov 9 The press continues to speculate on the new manager with former player Kenny Hibbitt and Sheffield Utd manager Steve Bruce being added to the list of possible candidates for the post.
- Nov 10 SHEFFIELD UTD (Home) 2-1 (Connolly, Robinson).

 Wolves again turn around a goal deficit to earn a well deserved win. Ryan Green deputising for the

injured Kevin Muscat makes an impressive league debut. David Connolly selected in the Republic of Ireland squad to play in the re-arranged European qualifying match v Yugoslavia on 18th November. He will therefore miss Wolves' match at Norwich on Saturday. Lee Naylor and Steve Sedgley will also miss the game; Naylor is with the England U18 squad and Sedgley is serving a one-match ban. Wolves set to sign midfielder Robert Niestroj from Fortuna Dusseldorf for £300,000.

- Nov 11 Steve Bull is out of action for another three months, after damaging his injured knee. There is also a doubt about his playing career.
- Nov 12 A FIFA ruling means that David Connolly will be available for Saturday's match at Norwich. He will not have to join up with the Irish squad (along with other members of the squad) until Saturday night.

 Lee Naylor is also available after the U18 tournament in which England were to compete, is cancelled.

 Wolves match at Tranmere has been switched to Friday 8th January for live showing by Sky TV.
- Nov 13 Wolves complete signing of Robert Niestroj for £3000,000 which could eventually rise to £500,000. He will not be available for the Norwich match as his registration has not gone through in time. Colin Lee is looking to bring in another player from the continent and plans to watch him tonight, before joining up with the team at Norwich. There is a boost for Wolves with the news that Robbie Keane may be on the substitutes bench. Howard Wilkinson is the latest name to be linked to the managers job.
- Nov 14 NORWICH CITY (Away) 0-0. A solid performance by Wolves who should have taken all three points, with a number of good chances being missed.

- Nov 15 More press speculation about the new manager with Forest manager Dave Bassett emerging as a front runner for the job, although he says that there has been no contact from Molineux. John Richards says that the position will not be discussed until the closing date for applications on 18th November.
- Nov 16 New signing Robert Niestroj makes an impressive debut in the reserves 3-0 win v Burnley and could be in line for a first team debut in Sunday's televised match v Birmingham.
- Nov 17 Former Liverpool keeper Bruce Grobbelaar says he has applied for the manager's post. Forest confirm they have had no contact from Wolves, and say they will reject any move for Dave Bassett. Colin Lee has been given the go-ahead to bring two more players into the club from the continent. Lee Naylor selected in Nationwide League squad to play Italian Serie B in Italy on 25th November.
- Nov 18 Colin Lee's chances of the manager's post have been increased after receiving encouragement from John Richards. David Platt rules himself out of contention at the present time. He said he would be definitely interested if the job was still available next summer. David Connolly makes substitute appearance for the Republic of Ireland in their 1-0 defeat v Yugoslavia.
- Nov 22 BIRMINGHAM CITY (Home) 3-1 (Naylor, Robinson 2). A stunning fightback by Wolves preserves Colin Lee's unbeaten record as temporary manager and considerably strengthens his chances of securing the post full-time. He says that he wants a quick decision from Wolves about the manager's job. Wolves linked with a move for Bradford City winger Peter Beagrie.

- Nov 23 Adrian Williams ruled out of action until the new year with the neck injury sustained whilst training with the Welsh squad in October.
- Nov 24 John Richards says the appointment of the new manager will be discussed by the Board this week.

 The list of candidates has been whittled down to ten, with Colin Lee amongst the favourites to land the post. A decision is expected after this week's match v Albion. Lee Naylor withdraws from the Nationwide League team to play the Italian Serie B, because of injury.
- Nov 26 Wolves are giving a trial to Australian keeper Dean Anastadiasis. He is 27 years old and plays for Carlton SC and is very highly rated. He is a good friend of Kevin Muscat and looking for a move into the English game. Steve Bull backs Colin Lee for the manager's job. Bully sets a new year target for his comeback. Lee Naylor will be fit for the Albion match.
- Nov 27 Wolves are expected to appoint Colin Lee as manager before the Albion match on Sunday.
- Nov 28 Colin Lee is confirmed as the new Wolves manager, initially until the end of the season.
- Nov 29 W.B.A. (Away) 0-2. After dominating for much of the first half, Wolves fall to second half sucker punch goals. Robert Niestroj makes an impressive first team debut as a second half substitute.
- Nov 30 Wolves reportedly interested in signing Forest winger Paul McGregor who is currently on loan at Carlisle and valued at £250,000. Colin Lee is also targeting another player on the continent.
- Dec 1 Wolves reject a Bristol City bid for Keith Curle.

 Colin Lee says he will be offering Curle an exten-

sion to his current contract which expires in the summer. Bristol City striker Ade Akinbiyi is one of a number of players being targeted by Lee as possible signings. Darren Ferguson to have a 7-10 day trial with Italian Serie B side Cosenza. He is one of 15 players out of contract in the summer.

- Dec 2 Guy Whittingham's loan period extended by a month. Wolves turn down increased offer from Bristol City for Keith Curle.
- Dec 3 Torquay right back and captain Andy Gurney to join Wolves on a 7-10 day trial starting Monday (7/12). Darren Ferguson has returned home after being caught up in rioting by local fans protesting about the sacking of their coach. Dominic Foley is likely to join Notts County on loan with the possibility of a permanent transfer, whilst Glen Crowe has been given a free transfer but will continue to train with Wolves until he finds a new club.
- Dec 5 BOLTON (Home) 1-1 (Emblen). Wolves again battle back from behind in another encouraging second half display. Mike Hickman resigns as coach and is returning to Australia.
- Dec 6 In the F.A.Cup 3rd round draw, Wolves are given an away tie at Bolton.
- Dec 7 Wolves are close to completing a deal for the mystery European striker recently watched by Colin Lee. They are also expecting to announce the appointment of a new coach this week. He is currently a player with a Premiership club.
- Dec 8 Dominic Foley joins Notts County on 1 month's loan with a view to a permanent signing. Former Bristol City manager John Ward is set to join Wolves as assistant manager. Kevin Muscat and

Simon Osborn will miss the away game at Bradford
City because of one match bans.

- Dec 9 The mystery Premiership player is revealed as
 Leicester's Garry Parker. Wolves want him to join
 them in a player-coach capacity. There could be a
 hitch as Leicester are looking to give him a coaching role with them. Mark McGhee linked to the
 vacant manager's job at Aberdeen.
- Dec 10 John Ward confirmed as Assistant Manager, although this may only be temporary as he will be available to talk to other clubs if a manager's job becomes available. Leicester refuse Wolves' move for Garry Parker. Glen Crowe may join Plymouth on loan.
- Dec 11 Paul Simpson rejoins Walsall for a further month's loan.
- NORWICH CITY (Home) 2-2 (Keane 2). Two late Dec12 Robbie Keane goals earn Wolves a point. Simon Osborn and Mark Jones are the only two out-of contract players to be offered new terms for next season. Of the remainder, Keith Curle has been recommended for an extension to his contract by Colin Lee, Dean Richards is keeping his options open, whilst Mark Atkins, Darren Ferguson, Paul Simpson, Glen Crowe, Justin Bray and Danny Hughes have been told they won't be retained for 1999/2000. Decisions are being deferred on Dominic Foley, Michael Gilkes, David Connolly and Fernando Gomez. Wolves are giving a second week's trial to promising Torquay defender Andy Gurney.
- Dec 14 Colin Lee to step up pursuit of continental striker and a player-coach.

- Dec 16 Dean Richards transfer-listed after failing to agree terms on an extended contract. Wolves unluckily lose to Middlesbrough in the E.A. Youth cup by 2-1 after dominating the match for long periods.
- Dec 17 Glen Crowe expected to join Plymouth after being on a week's trial.
- Dec 18 Steve Bull has finished a new course of treatment aimed at easing the knee injury which threatens to end his career, and is to return to full training on Monday. Colin Lee says that he is optimistic that the signing of the continental striker, believed to be a German, will be completed in the next few days.
- Dec 19 BRADFORD CITY (Away) 1-2 (Keane). A disappointing performance by Wolves despite a fine display by Mike Stowell.
- Dec 20 Wolves linked with a move for Pompey defender
 Andy Awford who is available at £150,000. John
 Hendrie is to sign Don Goodman on a 3-month
 contract for Barnsley, prior to the start of the new
 Japanese season.
- Dec 21 Colin Lee is hoping to have 2 new players in the side before the Boxing Day clash with Swindon.

 The home match with Ipswich on 28th December looks like attracting Wolves highest gate of the season.
- Dec 23 Norwegian striker Haavard Flo, currently with Werder Bremen, is revealed as the player Colin Lee has been chasing for the last few weeks. He has been offered a 3 year contract which he is reportedly happy with, and the deal is expected to be completed after Christmas for a fee of around £750,000. If all goes well he will make his debut at Tranmere on 8th January, live on Sky.

- Dec 24 Wolves reveal that it will be at least another two months before they'll be able to make a decision on whether Steve Bull will play again. Bully underwent further surgery earlier this week on his knee injury, and is set to be on crutches for the next three weeks. It will be the end of February before he can resume light training, but if the knee flares up again he will almost certainly have to end his career. If so, Bully has already been told that there is a job for him on the coaching staff at Molineux. The club have been selected to take part in a payper-view experiment next year. Their match at Grimsby Town on March 27th is one of six games that have been provisionally pencilled in although the exact fixtures are still to be confirmed by the Nationwide League.
- Dec 26 SWINDON TOWN (Away) 0-1. Wolves are made to pay for missing a number of golden chances as an injury time goal gives Swindon an undeserved win.

 There is an injury scare before the match as Mike Stowell suffers back spasm, but although he is in some discomfort during the match, plays superbly.
- Dec 28 IPSWICH TOWN (Home) 1-0 (Muscat). A magnificent strike by Kevin Muscat two minutes from time gives Wolves their first win since Colin Lee was confirmed as manager. Guy Whittingham is to return to Sheffield Wednesday at the end of his loan to make way for another loan signing by Colin Lee.
- Dec 31 Norwegian World cup star Haavard Flo will join Wolves on Monday in a £750,000 deal. The 28-year-old striker is likely to make his debut for Colin Lee's men against Tranmere at Prenton Park next Friday.



ANOTHER FIRST FOR WOLVERHAMPTON WANDERERS

As I am sure you are aware, a plaque was unveiled by Sir Jack Hayward just before the start of the season, in memory of the illustrious British composer, Sir Edward Elgar(1857-1934).

Elgar was a devoted Wolves fan and would ride his bicycle - all 30 miles - from Worcester where he was born, to Wolverhampton, for home games. A close friend said that music was the last thing that Elgar wanted to talk about; "all we ever talked about was football."

His favourite player was the legendary half-back, Billy Malpas, who played for Wolves between 1891 - 1899 and made 155 appearances, scoring 9 goals. A match report referred to Malpas attempting a spectacular shot at goal, which the reporter described as "he banged the leather for goal". Elgar was so taken with this curious phrase that he set it to music, thus undoubtedly producing the first fully documented football chant.



Match Reports

Portsmouth v Wolves 17th October 1998

Pompey sent **Victory** (A Knight to remember)



n a day windy enough for HMS Victory to have broken all sailing speed records, a very depleted Wolves side did enough to win this encounter, but were denied by some strange (to say the least), refereeing decisions, and some fine keeping from Portsmouth custodian Alan Knight.

Deprived by injury of Bull, Keane, Osborn, Williams and Richards, Wolves made most of the few chances that fell to either side, and even when reduced to ten men by a severe cut to the head of Gomez, made most of the running. Knight reacted quickly to a Carl Robinson shot after seven minutes, when diving full length to block the youngster's drive, and then saved bravely from Steve Corica, who fired a shot in from twelve yards.

Steve Sedgley had Wolves' best chance of the half, when he dribbled through, rounded the

Portsmouth however, did have two chances, one each to Claridge and Aloisi, the second of which was well saved by Mike Stowell. For all their efforts, Wolves could not get the ball in the net, and Portsmouth stole the points with a penalty, which resulted in the sending off of Keith Curle, and although Stowell dived the correct way, he could not stop Alan Mcloughlin from scoring low to his right.


