Wolves Women Season review

Wolves Women Matchday Reporter Matt Sacco gives his analysis on the club's first season back in the FA Women's Premier League:

Coming into the season as a newly promoted side, it was difficult to know what to expect. Last season saw us win the League and the League Cup double, losing just three times all season, so confidence was at a high.

Stepping up to the third tier of Women's football was always going to be a challenge; but losing our first three games was a real eye opener for the girls, who were coming to terms with the harsh realities of the Northern Premier League. Every mistake was being punished, teams are bigger, stronger and fitter, better technically and are better organised than the sides we faced last season.

The next game saw another defeat, this time at title-chasing Sheffield FC, however Wolves really stepped up their game and pushed them all the way, narrowly losing out 3-2 to a late goal.

A trip to Derby followed, and Wolves showed their battling qualities to come from behind and take all three points. This restored confidence to the team, as they next took on the challenge of Premier League side, Manchester City. Despite playing one division below, we played incredible football and scored a couple of stunning goals, but couldn't hold City off, drawing 4-4 in the League Cup.

Back to back defeats against Preston and Albion halted our progress, and the threat of relegation back to the Midlands Combination was becoming a real concern.

A cup win over Preston once again boosted confidence, and the next league games saw us take a point off high-flying Nottingham Forest, before star striker Dani Selmes scored a 90th minute winner to see off bottom of the league Leicester, pushing us away from the relegation zone.

Our first game of the New Year saw the girls travel down to Millwall for an FA Cup tie. Superb support from the London Wolves Supporters Club unfortunately wasn't enough to inspire the girls to victory.

A flurry of Cup games and water-logged pitches meant that the girls didn't play another league game until the third of March, during that time they reached the semi final of the County Cup, losing out to fierce rivals Albion 2-0.

As we stepped back to league action, we felt that a few more wins would secure our place in the league for next season, and we set about doing just that against Preston. The girls felt aggrieved after conceding two late goals to let the win slip through their fingers earlier this season, so two goals in the last three minutes felt like justice had been done as three more points were added to our tally.

Another series of waterlogged pitches halted our momentum; one whole month passed before our next game at home to Newcastle, where a combination of bad luck and poor decisions cost us a 1-0 defeat.

The girls quickly put that disappointment behind them, with a convincing 3-0 win over Leicester City to guarantee survival for the season. What followed was a succession of three difficult away defeats, which took the shine off what had already been achieved. However the final game of the season saw Wolves beat Derby in a closely-fought contest to end the season on a high, and do justice to the efforts put in over a long, hard season.

It has been a tough season for the squad, with some bad injuries along the way, but the girls feel that they have learnt a lot, and are confident of pushing on next season.

League Cup Final Winners Reunion Dinner



NO NEW YEARS HONOURS FROM THE PALACE

CRYSTAL PALACE 3-1 WOLVES

Tuesday 1st January 2013

Does Stale Solbakken really know what system he wants his team to play? Because if he does then the message doesn't seem to be getting through to his players. Having let that man Wilfred Zaha run riot in the corresponding fixture at Molineux, he was again allowed to strut his stuff with Solbakken's team having learnt nothing from losing that game 2-1 at the start of October.

After a bright start where a Davis right foot thunderbolt came back off the Palace crossbar, Wolves soon found themselves on the back foot. Zaha was at the centre of everything and he easily skipped passed Ward before cutting the ball back to Moritz who scuffed his shot wide from eight yards. He then fired a shot just over the bar before coming even closer with an effort that was cleared off the line.



It was only a matter of time and the goal eventually came in the 31st minute, Sako fouled Zaha on the edge of the area and Moritz struck the free-kick over the wall and into the top right hand corner of the net. Stearman was having a nightmare against Bolasie, and the Palace winger made it 2-0 just five minutes before the break when he latched onto a through ball from Zaha and poked the ball home past the advancing Ikeme.

Palace made it 3-0 with just seven minutes on the clock in the second half. Ward gave away a needless foul on the edge of the box and Moritz produced a carbon copy of his first goal, except this time he put the ball into the top left-hand side of the net. Against the run of play Wolves managed to pull one back in the 75th minute through Ebanks-Blake, the striker reacted quickly to collect a free-kick from O'Hara and turned sharply before firing past Speroni. However,

Wolves never looked like mounting a serious comeback and Palace finished the stronger of the two teams to claim all three points. It was a shocking performance in front of 1000 loyal fans that cut short their New Year's Eve celebrations to watch their team give nothing back in return.

SOLSACKEN

LUTON TOWN 1-0 WOLVES

Saturday 5th January 2013 (FA Cup 3rd Rnd)



Stale Solbakken's reign as manager of Wolves came to an end after one of the worst displays in many a year by a team wearing the old gold and black. Wolves went crashing out of the F.A. Cup to Blue Square Premier League side Luton Town, and afterwards manager Solbakken said he was "not embarrassed" by the defeat and was the right man to "put it right", Jez Moxey and the board decided otherwise and sacked him just three hours later.

It was a full-strength Wolves team that started with four internationals, but they were no match for Luton who deservedly went into the hat for the 4th round draw. However, Solbakken should not take all the blame for such an incompetent display, the Wolves players should hang their heads in shame after being outplayed and outfought by a team 59 places below them in the football league ladder.

Both sides enjoyed clear openings inside the first six minutes. O'Donnell fired over from the edge of the penalty area, before Doyle got in behind the Luton defence and send his effort wide with only the keeper to beat. Luton were handed a golden opportunity to open the scoring in the 22nd minute, the Wolves defence waited for an offside flag which never came and Ikeme had rush from his goal to block a shot from Gray. Wolves had to wait until the 43rd minute for their first shot on goal, and Doyle must have thought he had scored when he flicked a Sako corner goalwards, but his effort was pushed onto the post by Tyler in the Luton goal.

That save proved crucial with just a minute of the second half gone. A throw-in from the left was sent into the Wolves area and the ball fell to Lawless on the edge of the box who volleyed it into the bottom left-hand corner of the net. If Solbakken was hoping for a reaction from his players then he would have been disappointed. Berra nodded against the top of the bar in the 53rd minute, but otherwise Wolves were second best to a team that showed more spirit in one game than Wolves had done all season. There were nine minutes of injury time after O'Donnell was stretchered off, but there was little for Luton to worry about apart from a long range effort from O'Hara which Tyler tipped over the bar.

Wolves deservedly earned a point in this televised Friday night fixture. It was Dean Saunders first match at the helm, and even though he's had less than a week in the job it looks like he's already organised what's been at best a chaotic mess in defence all season. It would have been a win had the referee not awarded a disputed penalty to Rovers in the first half, TV

replays clearly showed that Rochina flicked out a leg in Sako's direction before executing a dive Tom Daley would have been proud of.

It was Wolves who started firmly on the front foot in the opening quarter, applying plenty of pressure and looking the livelier; however for all their endeavor the Rovers keeper was only forced into one real save from a Foley header. Then midway through the first half, and against the run of play Rovers took the lead through that disputed penalty. Rochina ran with the ball into the area before receiving minimal or no contact from Sako, the referee initially failed to award the penalty before his assistant flagged and Rhodes made no mistake from the spot.

Wolves continued to push forward in the second half and Murphy headed an in-swinging Sako corner off the line while Johnson nodded another Sako corner on to the roof of the net. Saunders introduced Jamie O'Hara in the 73rd minute and he made an instant impact. The midfielder had literally taken two steps onto the pitch when Ward rolled a short free-kick to him, without taking a first touch he arrowed a glorious cross into the Rovers area where Johnson was on hand to head home the equaliser.

Despite plenty of Wolves pressure that was the way it remained. Wolves' fans went home happy after watching a much more committed performance than those produced under Solbakken who seemed unable to motivate the team.

SHEFFIELD WEDS 0-0 WOLVES

Saturday 19th January 2013

Not a performance for the purists, but its two matches unbeaten for new manager Dean Saunders, and for Wolves their first clean sheet in eight matches. Wolves failed to force the Wednesday keeper into one single save during the game, but Saunders has already added a bit of steel to a defence who for most of the season have been watching Carl Ikeme pick the ball out of the net.



On a cold frosty pitch things initially looked promising for Wolves when a shot from Ebanks-Blake just cleared the crossbar with less than a minute on the clock, but for the next 20 minutes the supporters who had to endure the near Arctic weather conditions to get to the game must have wished they had stayed at home. Wednesday nearly scored when Ikeme smashed a clearance into the face of Antonio and knocked him sparko, but luckily for the keeper the ball went wide. But Ikeme made up for his lack of concentration when he made a great save to keep out Antonio's ferocious volley, he then denied Jermaine Johnson before grabbing and holding the ball on the line from a point blank Johnson header.

At the start of the second half Dean Saunders reverted to a 4-5-1 formation when he switched Doyle to the right wing leaving Ebanks-Blake to play as a lone striker. The tactic led to a scrappy affair with efforts on goal again at a premium, the best of a series of half chances went to Wednesday notably when a Berra slip allowed Antonio to gain possession in the area, but his shot was poor and sailed over the bar.

There was little else for the freezing

Wolves fans to cheer about and the only notable effort from the team was a fierce Doyle shot that went narrowly over the bar with four minutes left. Wednesday had a flurry of attacks late on which came to nothing and the game eventually petered out for the draw.

WOLVES 1-2 BLACKPOOL

Saturday 26th January 2013

Dean Saunders lost his first game since becoming the new manager at Wolves, and on this showing will be fighting to keep his team in the Championship. This was definitely a game of two halves. Wolves enjoyed the lion's share of the possession in the first half and then conceded an awful goal right on the stroke of half time, thereafter some of the bad habits shown in the Solbakken reign came back to the forefront for what turned out to be a woeful second half performance.



Wolves were buzzing from the off and deservedly took the lead in the 15th minute with a superbly worked goal. Peszko found Zubar overlapping on the right and his perfectly weighted cross was met with a bullet of a header by Ebanks-Blake. Doyle then saw a fierce shot charged down when an inswinging Sako free-kick caused bedlam. Ebanks-Blake then burnt the fingers of Gilks in the Blackpool goal as Wolves stormed forward. Next up was Doyle again when he headed onto the top of the bar from another Sako

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free-kick. But then, right on the stroke of half-time and just when it seemed Wolves would have to settle for a one goal lead at the break Blackpool equalised. Johnson attempted to shepherd the ball back to Ikeme when he should have put it over the Stan Cullis Stand, and as quick as a flash Ince nipped in between the two to fire the ball into the back of the net.

Ebanks-Blake came close to restoring Wolves lead seven minutes after the break, but even though there was plenty of power behind the shot it was straight at the keeper who saved with his legs. That miss proved decisive and Blackpool took control of the game. There was none of the build-up play shown by Wolves in the first half and most of the players were now playing as individuals rather than a team.

Blackpool's dominance in the second-half finally paid off in the 78th minute when Ince grabbed his second and what proved to be the winning goal. He drove forward deep into the Wolves half and unleashed a long range effort that Ikeme would have been disappointed to let in after he got a full hand on the shot. Wolves were unable to find a response, and Johnson finished off what was a dreadful performance for him when he was shown a straight red card right at the death following a tussle with Martinez.

That's just 2 points out of a maximum 12 for new boss Dean Saunders who seems unable to stop the rot set in during the Solbakken era. It's an old cliché but this really was a game of two halves, Leicester totally dominated the first half, but Wolves were much brighter in the second half, and

in the end can consider themselves unlucky to not get at least a point.

Leicester were by far the better team in the early stages and came close to opening the scoring with close efforts from Nugent and Knockaert. But it was Wolves almost went ahead against the run of play in the 15th minute, from two yards out Sigurdarson completely miss-headed the ball from a corner, Schmeichel then punched the ball into the path of Sako who aimed a pass across the six-yard box which was within an inch of Ebanks-Blake's outstretched foot. Leicester continued to press forward and finally made the breakthrough in the 24th minute. Schmeichel kicked the ball out of hand to Knockaert on the left, and even though he brought the ball under control with his arm he was allowed to play on, he dribbled the ball into the Wolves area unchallenged and fired past Ikeme. Karl Henry was lucky not to receive a red card a minute after the goal following a shocking tackle on King, but referee Madley felt a free-kick was punishment enough.



After being totally outplayed in the first half Wolves got off to the perfect start after the interval with an equaliser after just six minutes of the second half played, the ball fell to Sako 25 yards out and he hit an absolute screamer into the bottom-right corner that gave Schmeichel absolutely no chance.

Wolves looked re-juvenated after the goal, but went behind again with 15 minutes left following more disappointing defending. Nugent picked the ball up in his own half and like the first goal was allowed to the edge of the area unchallenged before slotting it past Ikeme. Wolves had a host of chances in the closing stages as they looked to get back on level terms. Ebanks-Blake missed a glorious chance when he headed wide from six yards, and then Sako forced Schmeichel into a good save with a shot from outside the area. Then in the dying seconds Ebanks-Blake went agonisingly close with an effort that struck the foot of the post.

Opinion: More effort shown like that in the second half should soon see Saunders soon picking up a few wins.

Our old friend Colin came back to Molineux with his new team Leeds United, and how nice it was to see him leave Wolverhampton with that cretinous snarl on his face. It all seemed to be going pear shaped for Wolves until Danny Batth popped up in the area in injury time to score his first league goal and snatch a dramatic late point.



Wolves were without a win in seven league games and their early play reflected the lack of confidence among the players. Leeds had the lion's share of the play, although Ikeme was hardly threatened by efforts at goal. Wolves eventually started to settle down and although they constantly gave the ball away Ebanks-Blake did find the back of the net midway through the half, but he was flagged for offside. Scannell beat Doherty for pace on the left and then cut inside the penalty area, he then left Hunt for dead before slotting the ball past De Vries.

Wanderers started the second half as they had the first, on the attack. Efforts from Doyle, Ward and Sigurdarson all went close, but Johnson was guilty of a horrible miss in the 65th minute when he somehow dragged his shot wide from six yards with the goal at his mercy. Within a couple of minutes the significance of the miss was rammed home. Vaughan headed goalwards from a corner, and even though De Vries produced a superb save to keep the ball out Beckford was on hand to tap home from close range. Within a minute Beckford made it 3-1 after Wolves made a mess of the resulting kick-off, the Huddersfield striker left the hapless Johnson for dead and then calmly lobbed the ball over the advancing De Vries.

Matters went from bad to worse straight from the subsequent kick-off, Southern charged into O'Hara and the brainless midfielder was given a straight red card for

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raising his hands in retaliation. It was game over and Huddersfield easily played out time to move two points clear of the relegation zone. As for Wolves things are looking desperate, an injury list as long as your arm coupled with a three match suspension for O'Hara leaves their Championship survival hanging by a thread.

At the end of the game you would have thought it was Wolves who were second in the Championship promotion race and not opponents Hull who were on the brink of automatic promotion. The game was now swaying from end to end and it was Wolves' turn to go close. Hunt stayed on his feet following a challenge by Elmohamady in the area, where had he gone down he would have surely have won a penalty, however when the ball fell at Sigurdarson's feet the striker could only find the side netting when just two yards out and the goalkeeper nowhere.

Four minutes of injury time did little for the nerves of the home followers, but Wolves held out to claim the three points and boost their chances of avoiding a second successive relegation to England's third tier for the first time since 1989.
